


Adult Preparation

- 2. Ask children not to guess what the object might be until everyone has had a turn to feel it.
- 3. Discussion:
- When is a bandage needed? (When someone has been hurt with a cut, scrape, etc.)
- Share about a time when you needed a bandage.

Note: Leave bandages in wrappers, as they will be used for several activities throughout the day.







Class Book: Working in Tiny Town

Tip: Children of all ages need many opportunities to develop their writing skills. Young children can participate in this activity by drawing shapes, scribbles, lines and designs. This is an important step in developing confidence in their writing skills. Encourage children to take ownership in their writing by reading to you what they have written. Did You Know? Writing skills are also developed through manipulative play such as cutting, sorting, tracing, playing with play dough, using tongs to pick up cotton balls or drawing in sand.


Activity - Children and Adult

- 1. Use the following questions to help children formulate thoughts and dictate a sentence for their book page.
- What are different types of jobs?
- What do you do at these different jobs?
- What is a job you would like to do?
- Why do you want to do this job?
- 2. Children may dictate a sentence that is reflective of the discussion above. Encourage children (who are able) to write letters, words or sentences.
- 3. Children may also illustrate their pictures and write their name on their page.
- 4. Staple completed pages and cover together to create a book. (Or use a hole punch and bookbinder ring or yarn to assemble your class book.)
- 5. Gather together to read the class book.



Place all your class books here. Allow children to read the class books freely and to share them with their parents when they are picked up.
